WHERE WE ARE

With this newsletter, we signal the near end of our ninth year. Mary Carroll Nelson founded SLMM in May, 1982. The society is a nonprofit organization, incorporated in the State of New Mexico, to serve as a network for artists who share a holistic perspective. There were six members then and today there are 125 full and associate members. As membership has expanded, our intention has deepened to one of service in an effort to heal ourselves and others through art.

The first show of layered art was an invitational exhibit held at the Albuquerque (New Mexico) Museum in the summer of 1985. SLMM held its first membership show ''Layering/Connecting'' at the Zanesville (Ohio) Art Center and the Stifle Fine Art Center of Wheeling, West Virginia, in the summer of 1987. Those of us who finally saw our work hanging together were struck by the quality of energy that seemed to link such disparate artwork.

"Layering/Level to Level" was on exhibit at the Johnson-Humerickhouse Museum in Roscoe Village, Coshocton, Ohio all summer in 1989. The work was displayed in one gallery and this accentuated the inner energy of the art.

An anticipated show will be mounted at the Art Galleries of the Marin County Civic Center, California, in October 1991. SLMM produced a video of 83 members' art in 1990.

In process is a book, "Layering, An Art of Time and Space" which will be printed in Thailand. Seventy-three members are included. The video and book are portable substitutes for viewing an SLMM exhibition.

A more space-filling project is now underway by fifty-two members and associate members who are working on modules for a "Healing Shrine." These artists have exchanged materials from their studios to be included in the shrine segments. The inspiration for the shrine grew from our national meeting in Coshocton in June, 1990. The shrine will be completed in time for the meeting at The Cliff House, Ogunquit, Maine this June 1991. The expectation is that the shared energies of this cooperative construction will be as palpable as the subtle connections we have perceived in SLMM exhibitions. If possible, the "Healing Shrine" will be shown first in Bradford College next fall and then toured for two years.

ART AND HEALING CONFERENCE

Marilyn Phillis wrote, after the conference, "What a beautiful conference and glorious fall weekend. I think that those who were there are better for being there and the ripple effect is going to reach out across the country in many small ways." Jeny Reynolds said, "Many memories, I hope will linger in my mind of the friendships, sharing, love and thoughtfulness from one to another - I call it the spirit of magic."

In October 1990, SLMM co-sponsored "Art and Healing" with AMERICAN ARTIST magazine at New Harmony, Indiana, a restored Utopian village. The conference was an almost uncanny realization of the intention to be of service that SLMM formulated at the 1989 national meeting in Santa Monica, CA. Our membership outdid itself in serving as presenters, and in attendance. Mary Carroll Nelson was asked to create

the original concept for the weekend, which Editor-in-Chief Steve Doherty then organized and directed so well. Among the speakers was our president Richard Newman, who delivered a most moving account of his own transformation through art. Keynote speaker was Dr. Willis Harman, president of the Institute of Noetic Sciences, and Dr. Leonard Wisneski spoke about Transformational Medicine. Jerry Croghan gave a sensitive talk about society, art and healing. Hands-on/minds-on workshops were given by Marilyn Hughey Phillis, Virginia Lee Williams and Rochelle Newman. Personal experiences told by Pat Musick, Beth Ames Swartz, Meinrad Craighead and Gilah Yelin Hirsch. illustrated by slides, were inspiring. Another affective aspect of the program was a sandtray mandala workshop given by Marion Weber. We were blessed by the good weather and the sense of a sacred place, created by the angel of New Harmony, Indiana Jane Blaffer Owen, who supported the conference. Dr. Joel Elkes was the spiritual leader of the weekend and he summarized his thoughts for all of us when it ended. In the April issue of AMERICAN ARTIST, reference will be made to the conference and there will be illustrations

of some work by SLMM members included, as of this writing.

QUOTES "..."

From our new Honorary Member, Dr. Joel Elkes, speaking to the "Art and Healing" Conference:

"We are always at the moving center, but sometimes this center begins to glow . . . at the present time this center is glowing, is getting warm and hot, because there is going to be a radical change . . . I cannot but feel as a physician whose job after all is to heal the BodyMind, which is one word, not two, the BodyMind, that there is a huge change to come in the healing profession . . . healing is a personal affair . . . unless you tackle the person and society at the same time, you cannot have true healing."

In an article about Dr. Elkes' work (from the University of Louisville magazine ET ULTRA),

"His basic supposition - that the mind and behavior can be pathogens, or sources of disease, as well as sources of health - challenges the prevailing view of disease as organic in origin and of the brain as a benign mental machine."

"Elkes believes 'the initiative a person takes toward their health, no matter how serious the condition can influence the course of health and, if lucky, can promote recovery."

Marilyn Phillis attended the Common Boundary Conference in November. She said of Thich Nhat Hanh's talk on Mindfulness.

"It was like experiencing a lotus opening - gradual beauty being shared."

From the SANTA FE SUN, Valentine Riddell, "The Healing Art Experience," the author was ill with scoliosis and ovarian cancer. She studied alternative healing systems. Then she made a pelvic cast of plaster bandage and finished the piece with found objects and paint to depict her abdominal pain. She then followed that with a healthy pink creation, shimmering with silver threads and mylar stars to symbolize the healing she wanted. Gradually, her pain subsided, her energy returned, and she gained back the weight she had lost.

"The healing process in both of these diseases followed a layered recovery pattern . . . All that we see, all that we are, is vibrating energy. That which vibrates faster we have perceived as light, or sound, or even thought . . . As vibrational beings, we resonate with everything around us, sometimes harmoniously, sometimes not. Art-making . . . is a symbolic way of expressing and releasing one's emotions . . . The purpose of Healing Art is to alert us to the knowledge that we truly are creating our reality in a very physical sense, and that we need to be clear about what kind of reality we wish to experience. We can choose between a lifetime of dysfunction and disease or one of synchronous, vibrant good health."

Riddell acknowledges that healing may be to return to health and vitality, or to have a peaceful death, or renewed confidence. All healings share balance, calm and trust.

Marilyn Christenson brought to our attention a quote from Annie Dillard's LIVING BY FICTION.

"The most extreme, cheerful, and fantastic view of art to which I ever subscribe is one in which the art object requires no viewer or listener - no audience whatever - in order to do what it does, which is nothing less than to hold up the universe."


